

What is Person-first language?

Person-first language emphasizes the person as an individual, before any other identity-defining language.



How do you implement person-first language?



Using respectful, person-first language promotes understanding and acceptance, emphasizing the value and worth of individuals while being inclusive. When addressing students who identify outside binary constraints, it is considerate to learn their preferred pronouns or preferred name so that you can ackowledge them with respect.


Begin this practice as early as possible! This helps to build rapport from the first day of school.





Personalize language!

Intentionally talk to students about their interests, compliment their style, or show genuine curiosity in their hobbies / extracurricular activities.



Students surveyed* indicated that support and acceptance are best shown through the following actions:

- 88% Trusting that I know who I am
- 81% Standing up for me
- 62% Looking up things about LGBTQ+ identities on their own to better understand
- 59% Respecting my pronouns
- 57% Showing support for how I express my gender

What is currently said

"Good morning boys and girls! I will read role call of your names, please indicate you are here by raising your hand."

"Husband/Wife.
Mom/Dad"*

No comments about student interests

"'It'** thinks..."

"Hey man"

What can be said instead

"Good morning everyone, on your surveys please let me know if you have a preferred nickname or pronouns, that way I can address you how you would prefer."

"Parent, Guardian, Significant Other, Partner"

Genuine compliments:

"That jacket is so stylish!"**

"You writing is so interesting,
keep at it!"

"They think"

"Hey kiddo"
